

Academic:



For our topic Owls have been learning all about themselves. We have talked about our different features and identifying our similarities and differences from being a baby to how we look now. 


As part of our Talk 4 Writing Innovation, a question was raised – 'why do fish blow bubbles?' to find out the answer, we watched a video on the laptop. We

Hedgehogs:

Academic:



This week in maths, all of the children have been developing their skill of sorting. We enjoyed reading 'The Button Box' by Margarette S. Reid and then deciding on our own criteria to sort our set of buttons by. We discovered we could sort them by colour, shape or the number of holes in the middle. The year one children were then challenged to find two features that were the same to sort by. Lots of children decided to sort by shape AND by colour. Well done everyone, now let's try to apply this skill when we are tidying!




Character:

We have been focusing very heavily on the character virtues of courtesy and respect this past week. We enjoyed reading the story 'The Bad Seed' by Jory John and discussing ways in which we can show courtesy and respect towards our environment and each

other. The children came up with lots of ideas including:

- not pushing in line
- holding doors open for people
- being on time and ready for learning
- putting equipment away once we've finished with it
- washing our hands
- remembering to say 'please' and 'thank-you'
- looking at the person who is talking and taking turns in conversation
- using our indoor voices when we are in the classroom

We also spoke about how it is important to show courtesy and respect at all times so that we can have a happy classroom!



Community:



All of the children have settled back into school life really well over the past two weeks and our new hedgehogs have picked up the routines and expectations brilliantly. We are so proud of how they have adjusted to a new setting and immersed themselves into their learning already. Well done everyone! To kick start our new topic, we all enjoyed an 'Elmer Day' last week where we celebrated our differences and discussed what makes us all special and unique. The children were invited to dress up to show off their individuality and they



looked fantastic!

We also enjoyed many stories and lots of 'Elmer' themed activities.



Innovation:

This week we have been learning about self-portraits and we have looked at the work of Picasso and Vincent Van Gough. The children were invited to create their own portraits using any style and media they wanted. Some children chose to paint, some used collage and some used their newly acquired skill of using a touchpad to create one on the laptop.



Squirrels:

Academic:



The children have jumped straight into their learning. They have all started the place value unit in maths. The children have completed some lessons practically using manipulatives. In our English unit Squirrels have been focussing on The Magic Porridge Pot. We have story-mapped the story and acted out the story. In our topic work we have looked at the different stages of life from Baby to Elderly. We have also looked at how important life events are to different families and different life events are celebrated for different families.

Character:

Since returning back to school we have been looking at reflection. From Reflecting on the previous year to then reflecting on our time back in school. Also focusing on reflecting on the work that is done and different behaviours appropriate for school. Our new virtues this week are Courtesy and Respect. The focus of these virtues are making sure we respect our learning spaces and school environment and showing courtesy and respect to all adults and children within school.



Community:



Our school community is looking fantastic at the moment, especially the outdoor areas. Our focus in Squirrels is to make sure we look after our classroom community by tidying up after ourselves and being helpful towards others when needed. Squirrels spoke about a community in their RE lesson last week with Miss Smith. Focusing on what makes a community, the different communities in the local area and when communities come together. As a class we also spoke about being a school community, linking to our virtue of respect and how we respect our school community.

Digital and Innovation:

Squirrels have demonstrated being Digital Innovators this week by attempting to log on to the new KS1 Chromebooks. Each child has been allocated a chromebook that remains in school for them to use. These will help to enable us to deliver the Computing objectives easily. However, we will also be able to complete a range of activities on these Chromebooks.



Foxes

Academic:



The children have finished a unit on Haiku's and created their own which are about a beach at sunset. We are just starting our unit on the BFG which the children seem enthusiastic about. In maths, children have been looking at number lines this week and have been working on 1,10 and 100 more or less.

Character:

The children have all shown compassion and courtesy in welcoming our new classmates this week. The children have been trying very hard to make sure that the brothers feel welcome in the class and understand what they should be doing.




Community:

Digital and Innovation:




The children have been using their chromebooks to research the different groups of early settlers which we have been looking at for our topic. The year 4's have been sharing their chromebooks very nicely with the year 3's and we collaboratively created a jamboard which showcased all of the information the children had found out.

Badgers

Academic:

Badger class have returned to school full of enthusiasm. They are thoroughly enjoying our WW2 topic and it is great to see that they have remembered their prior learning in Year 1 and 2! We have focused quite heavily on handwriting and presentation so far and I am pleased to say this is now improving.





Character:

The children have all been amazing in developing their leadership skills this term. They have all had training as play leaders to provide lunchtime fun activities for the younger children in school. They have also been amazing volunteers helping the younger children to cut up their food.

Community:



Badger children went on an amazing local visit on Tuesday morning to the Solar Farm at Rexon near Roadford Lake. It was fascinating to learn about the wildlife that is encouraged and to learn how solar panels work and how many houses a 20 acre site can power.

We then had a workshop to use mini solar panels to power motors, LEDs, fans and buzzers.



Digital and Innovation:

In order to take our poetry a step further, Badger class have used clipchamp to put their ideas into film. They have made their words fade in and out with wartime pictures behind them and they have added emotive music.

James Creek, our dedicated Inclusion Officer, is committed to helping children attend school full-time by supporting both pupils and parents in resolving any issues which could impact our young people attending school. His mission is to create an inclusive and welcoming educational environment, ensuring every student has the opportunity to thrive. James works closely with students and parents to overcome barriers relating to school attendance, providing valuable assistance through parenting courses and facilitating support from the local authority. His efforts make a significant impact on our students holistic development.

Free School Meals

Could your child be entitled to Free School Meals? If you are in receipt of any of the following your child should be entitled to Free School Meals:

- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods).
- Income Support (IS).
- Income-based Jobseekers Allowance (IBJSA).
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance (IRESA).
- The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit.
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999.
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income that does not exceed £16,190).
- Working Tax Credit run-on (the payment you get for a further 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit).

Do you receive any of the following?

- Income support
- Employment Support Allowance (Income Related)
- Income based Job Seekers Allowance
- Guaranteed Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit and your income (as calculated by the Inland Revenue) is less than £16,190
- Universal Credit
- Receiving support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act of 1999
- In the Armed Forces

If you can answer yes to any of the above you may qualify for free school meals/Pupil Premium

The school office will help with your application. If your application is successful not only will your child receive free school meals, but our school will receive £1,300 additional funding (per child). This is called Pupil Premium.
