

Hedgehogs




Academic:

This week the children have been exploring materials in science and had to decide which ones would be best to make a cape for a war time hero from. They decided that paper and card is too absorbent and rock, metal and glass are too heavy and stiff. Fabrica and soft plastic were the best as they are strong, soft and flexible. The children are now in the process of making their capes which they will enjoy showing off next week.

Character:

Academic:



Foxes




Academic:

The year 3's have very nearly finished their Addition and Subtraction unit. The year 4's have been doing Area and are starting a unit on Multiplication and Division. In Literacy the class have been very busy writing their own third person adventure stories. In Topic we have been looking at the Victorian industrial revolution and comparing it to the Pearl River Delta as a contemporary case study. The children enjoyed learning about how the pollution has meant that fish in the river taste like shampoo!

Character:

The children have been using lots of their character virtues in order to make sure that we finish things off before Christmas. Children have been determined and resilient to complete their work. They have been showing curiosity and compassion for the people who live near the Pearl River Delta and thinking about why their lives may be better or worse due to the rapid industrialisation.





Community:

Foxes class really enjoyed meeting the police dog last week. The children even got a chance to stroke her! They learnt what police dogs do and how police officers work with them. The children were also very lucky to have a film night organised for them by the Badger Class. The children all enjoyed their hot dog and their popcorn and of course watching Nativity 2.

Digital and Innovation:

In computing, children have been learning how to use google slides on their chromebooks. In Art the children have been enjoying learning about Leonardo Da Vinci and thinking about how he is an inventor and an artist. On Wednesday we went on a nature walk around the school and had a go at imitating his sketches of the natural world. We also discussed how the sketches would look different if we did them in the summer term compared to how they look now. We are also about to start working on Christmas decorations and practising our performance for the carol concert next Thursday.

Academic:

Badger children have been working extremely hard to add interest to their writing through the use of noun phrases, adverbs and clauses. They have also been reviewing their work with their purple pens to ensure that their punctuation and spelling is at the expected level for a year 5 or 6 child.

Character:



As Christmas approaches our character virtues become more and more important. Badger children have managed to stay determined and motivated as the excitement grows. They have also thought about others through our PSHE lessons showing kindness and friendship. Curiosity has also played a part in our learning as we have looked at Christmas around the world. Free School Meals

Could your child be entitled to Free School Meals? If you are in receipt of any of the following your child should be entitled to Free School Meals:

- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods).
- Income Support (IS).
- Income-based Jobseekers Allowance (IBJSA).
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance (IRESA).
- The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit.
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999.
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income that does not exceed £16,190).
- Working Tax Credit run-on (the payment you get for a further 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit).

To check eligibility and apply visit

https://www.devon.gov.uk/educationandfamilies/school-information/school-meals/ This is the quickest and easiest way to apply and will result in you getting an instant decision. Alternatively, call the Education Helpline on 0345 155 1019.



Do you receive any of the following?

- Income support
- Employment Support Allowance (Income Related)
- Income based Job Seekers Allowance
- Guaranteed Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit <u>and</u> your income (as calculated by the Inland Revenue) is less than £16,190
- Universal Credit
- Receiving support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act of 1999
- In the Armed Forces

If you can answer yes to any of the above you may qualify for free school meals/Pupil Premium

The school office will help with your application. If your application is successful not only will your child receive free school meals, but our school will receive £1,300 additional funding (per child). This is called Pupil Premium.
