

On the school website, we have some very useful safeguarding tips around online safety, social media, devices, gaming and mental health to provide some support or guidance if needed.



Owls


Academic:

This week we enjoyed a trip up to Beer Mill. We were on the lookout for any signs of Spring. We found some flowers that had started to grow and saw some buds on trees.

We also went on a bug hunt! We found some worms, slugs and spiders. We had a go at measuring them and investigating them through our new magnifying jars. Owls were all very Curious and listened well to Elaine. They showed Friendliness towards our minibeasts and carefully returned them all back to their homes.







Digital and Innovation:

For Klassen this week, we have decided to make pizza! Just like The Little Red Hen did in her story. We have been learning how to be friendly and share. So taking it in turns to use the kitchen utensils and sharing the ingredients.

Owls have been busy designing their own bear hunt story maps, using a range of different materials and resources and using their Critical Thinking, they recalled the story step by step and created some marvellous story maps.



Hedgehogs

Academic:

This half term, the reception and year one children are discovering the changes that happen during spring. In a previous lesson, we looked at how the apple tree outside our classroom changes during each season. This afternoon we learnt about pollination and how the blossom

Character:



Squirrels




Academic:

This week Squirrels have been writing their recount stories about an event that has happened, they have had to think about the past tense. In maths the children have been learning about volume and capacity and gram, kilograms, litres and millilitres. We have also been looking at Yanomami tribes in the rainforest!

Foxes

Academic:

Fox class have been working really hard learning about the commutative law and using it to help us get equations for 'free'. In Literacy we have finally started to write our ancient Egyptian stories, we have some very imaginative story lines forming!

In Geography we have been learning about the water cycle and what affects it. The children were particularly interested in learning about acid rain. We also learnt about the cloud seeding which takes place in Dubai. They have also really enjoyed learning the water cycle rap!

In Science the children have been working on classifying animals and plants.

We are working towards completing a habitat survey at the end of next week. We were lucky with the weather last week, so we took to the playground to work on classification keys.



Character:



In art we have been practising sketching 3D objects, using our observation skills to find shapes and shading to make them look 3D.

Character:

We have been getting muddy in our outdoor learning spaces 'eggsploring' easter traditions and symbols. They also prepared an area for planting wildflower seeds to attract the bees and investigated filtration in soil. A huge thank you to Ads, Wendy and Sarah for their time and effort. All of the children had an 'eggcellent' morning.









Community:

Badgers enjoyed a trip to the Recycling Centre in Plymouth where they learned all about the different stages of recycling and how waste can be converted into energy. The children were each given a free pencil made from recycled banknotes!



Digital and Innovation:

This week in Art we have been applying our understanding of the drawing technique Chiaroscuro. We have been discussing the effects of light and dark on an object/image and considering how to draw it. I think you'll agree they've done a great job.

Free School Meals

Could your child be entitled to Free School Meals? If you are in receipt of any of the following your child should be entitled to Free School Meals:

- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods).
- Income Support (IS).
- Income-based Jobseekers Allowance (IBJSA).
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance (IRESA).
- The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit.
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999.
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income that does not exceed £16,190).
- Working Tax Credit run-on (the payment you get for a further 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit).

https://www.devon.gov.uk/educationandfamilies/school-information/school-meals/ This is the quickest and easiest way to apply and will result in you getting an instant decision. Alternatively, call the Education Helpline on 0345 155 1019.



Do you receive any of the following?

- Income support
- Employment Support Allowance (Income Related)
- Income based Job Seekers Allowance
- Guaranteed Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit and your income (as calculated by the Inland Revenue) is less than £16,190
- Universal Credit
- Receiving support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act of 1999
- In the Armed Forces

If you can answer yes to any of the above you may qualify for free school meals/Pupil Premium

The school office will help with your application. If your application is successful not only will your child receive free school meals, but our school will receive £1,300 additional funding (per child). This is called Pupil Premium.

All applications are confidential.
