## **Attendance Expectations**

#### What YOU must do:

- → Try to telephone the school before 8.30am each day of your child's absence.
- → Tell the school in advance of any medical appointments and bring in appointment cards/letters.
- → If you are not sure whether your child is well enough to attend school, send them in anyway as they often perk up on arrival.
- → Have a backup plan for if your child misses transport, call on a family member, neighbour or friend.
- → If you and your child are experiencing difficulties with school attendance then talk to us as a first step so we can help!

#### What WE will do:

- ★ Check your child's attendance every day.
- ★ Phone home to discuss your child's attendance with you.
- ★ Invite you into school for attendance meetings if we are concerned.
- ★ If we cannot establish a reason for absence, then we may make a welfare home visit.

### **Owls**

#### Academic:

As we returned back to preschool after half term, Owls have come back with lots of enthusiasm and dived straight back into their learning adventures. We are on an African adventure this term, with learning opportunities around every corner.

Last week we discovered a great story called 'Handa's Surprise'. Just like Handa, we tried carrying a basket of fruit on our heads but found it tricky as the fruit kept falling off! Owls demonstrated resilience and kept trying different ways to balance the fruit. For our klassen last week we had the seven fruits (well six, as we couldn't find guava) that were mentioned in the story. Owls cut up the fruit and enjoyed them in the outside classroom.









We have been exploring African music. Listening to some African songs and playing the Djembe drums. This week we have been exploring the art of Kente (African weaving). Owls have been creating some lovely Father's Day crafts.







#### **Character:**

We have been focusing on our Citizenship virtue and Owls have now become Inspiring Volunteers. This was achieved by volunteering to help tidy the school garden during their gardening session. They helped Wendy and Sarah to

pull up the weeds, thus being good Citizens!



#### **Community:**

During our gardening session, as well as tidying up the school garden, Owls have been focusing on worms. We have found out where they live, what they like to eat and how they make compost.

We explored the wormery with its many layers and fed them some fruit peelings. We then explored the compost heap and found lots of worms. The boys enjoyed this more than the girls!









## **Digital and Innovation:**

With Handa's surprise being a popular activity to explore these last two weeks, we all sat and watched the dvd story. Owls noticed some differences between Handa and themselves. They noticed that Handa carries items on her head and we carry items in bags.

Our new Talk for Writing story brings 'Sunny' (our preschool mascot) to life. As we learn all about Sunny's habitat and family through a fun story 'Meerkat Mail' written by Emily Gravett. So far we have learnt that Sunny lives in a big family in the Kalahari Desert where it is very dry and hot and Sunny needs to look out for jackals.






# Hedgehogs

#### **Character:**

This week the children tested their patience with a fruity challenge! They were given the task of balancing a coin on a floating lemon which proved to be very difficult! Some children were extremely determined to succeed and spent a whole afternoon using their critical thinking skills to test different approaches. Some children thought coins with a larger surface area may be more successful while others wanted to try a bigger lemon. Another child thought that maybe the heavier coins would work. Well done everyone, you showed so much resilience with this activity!





# **Community:**

After receiving the fruits from Africa, Mrs. Paget challenged us to become Inspiring Researchers and find out which continent other fruits grow in. We used our critical thinking skills and decided that they couldn't grow in Antarctica because it would be too cold so it had to be one of the other six!

#### Innovation:


We have been recapping on our ICT skills this week, particularly using the tools on the Paintz App. The children were asked to create a digital picture of a pineapple and print it for display. We will also be revising our word processing skills over the next few weeks.



# **Squirrels**

#### Academic:

Squirrels have been fantastic at learning to tell the time this week. We have looked at past the hour and to the hour, o'clock, quarter past and quarter to, and 5 minute intervals. The children have found this a challenge but have demonstrated resilience, creativity and determination! In English this week we have been focusing on similes and alliteration. These have been very creative!



#### Character:

Our focus virtue this week has been citizenship. The children have been fantastic citizens around school in all areas, demonstrating a friendly warm environment. The children have embraced keeping the field clean and tidy at lunch times and break times. The children have also demonstrated creativity and resilience during learning times too this week.





#### Community:

All of the children have been practising for Sports Day and we are very excited to share this afternoon with you next week! Don't forget to cheer on your team!

#### **Digital and Innovation:**

This week as part of our Geography topic about features. We have used the Chrome book to look at different types of maps. We first looked at paper maps then we compared these to online versions of maps. We looked at what is the same and different and identified the human features of Clawton, allowing us to become Global Citizens!

#### **Academic:**

The children have shown amazing resilience as they tackled tricky perimeter problems in maths. They wrapped up their diary entries with some really creative ideas. We've also just started diving into newspaper reports and their curiosity is leading to some fantastic discussions about what makes a good news story. On top of all that, they've taken on their final NFER papers of the year with a lot of motivation and determination. It's been a busy 2 weeks, but their hard work and enthusiasm has kept them going.

#### **Character:**

This week, our focus has been on the character virtue of citizenship, and the children have really embraced what it means to be good citizens both in school and in the wider world. In the spirit of school citizenship, we've been collaborating with Badger Class on our upcoming school production, and it's been wonderful to see everyone working together and supporting one another. As global citizens, the kids have been learning about environmental regions and comparing their own lives with those of children in Norway. They were particularly fascinated—and a bit jealous—of the idea of Norwegian children husky sledding to school!



#### Community:

The children have been showing wonderful community spirit by teaming up to plan their final computing project of the year: creating an advertisement for our school. They will be using the various skills they've learned throughout the year to bring this project to life. So far, they've been brainstorming ideas and working together beautifully, combining their talents to create something special.

#### **Digital and Innovation:**

Last week, we kicked off our exciting new art project for the half term: 'Fabric of Nature'. The children showed the character virtue of creativity and began creating mood boards inspired by the rainforest, gathering and arranging images, colours, and textures that capture its vibrant flora and fauna. These mood boards are helping them generate ideas for designing their own fabric patterns, which they will develop over the coming weeks. The creativity and enthusiasm they've shown in bringing their rainforest visions to life have been fantastic, and we can't wait to see their moodboards evolve into beautiful fabric designs!



# **Badgers**



#### Academic:

Badger class have now completed their next chapters for the book 'The Boy who grew Dragons'. They were very imaginative and used similes and metaphors in their writing in order to make the reader want to read on.

#### **Character:**

For D Day Badger children looked at the landing sites on the Normandy beaches. They also cooked wartime carrot biscuits which were surprisingly nice and enjoyed an assembly focused on our character virtue of citizenship with Rev. Paul.







# Community:

This week we joined a virtual trip to the Eden Project. We had a tour of the Rainforest biome and learnt about how plants are adapted to life in the rainforest. Some have very waxy leaves to shed the rain, others have leaves that curl up to make predators think they are dead!

### Digital and Innovation:

All of KS2 have started work on the Production this week. They have words to learn, songs to sing and they need to remember where and when they need to be on stage. The production is 'Rock Bottom'. Children will be bringing home costume letters soon!

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### **Free School Meals**

Could your child be entitled to Free School Meals? If you are in receipt of any of the following your child should be entitled to Free School Meals:

- Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods).
- Income Support (IS).
- Income-based Jobseekers Allowance (IBJSA).
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance (IRESA).
- The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit.
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999.
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income that does not exceed £16,190).
- Working Tax Credit run-on (the payment you get for a further 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit).

# Do you receive any of the following?

- Income support
- Employment Support Allowance (Income Related)
- Income based Job Seekers Allowance
- Guaranteed Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit <u>and</u> your income (as calculated by the Inland Revenue) is less than £16,190
- Universal Credit
- Receiving support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act of 1999
- In the Armed Forces

# If you can answer yes to any of the above you may qualify for free school meals/Pupil Premium

The school office will help with your application. If your application is successful not only will your child receive free school meals, but our school will receive £1,300 additional funding (per child). This is called Pupil Premium.
