Academic: What an exciting journey we've had this term as our Who Am I? topic comes to a joyful conclusion! Our Owls have been busy exploring big questions like 'Who are my special people?' and 'Where do I live and go to preschool?' Their Who Am I? boxes have been a huge success, with









each Owl blossoming into a confident communicator, proudly sharing their photos, family portraits, and cherished memories. It's been a delight to watch them take ownership of their special boxes. Along with celebrating their special people and unique qualities, we've also embraced our wonderful preschool community. Crafting Clawton emblems and Devon flags gave the children a creative way to build a sense of place, while enjoying a cream tea with handmade scones reminded us of the warmth of friendship and belonging.

Character: We couldn't be prouder of the adventurous spirits and beautiful acts of friendship our Owls have displayed! Reading the story of Elmer, we've learned to celebrate both the traits that unite us and those that make us uniquely special. The themes of friendliness and inclusivity have continued to shine as the children show kindness in their play whether sharing umbrellas on rainy days or taking turns with the resources. Our focus on building resilience has inspired the Owls to embrace new challenges. Back at preschool, we rolled up our sleeves for a special harvest taster afternoon. The Owls proudly picked corn from the garden and worked together to prepare the delicious seasonal treat. Hedgehogs and Squirrels - Where does Paddington live and what is it like?

Academic:

This week the children have been exploring the properties of materials and thinking about which ones would be best for an umbrella for Paddington. We tested the strength, flexibility and absorbency of tin foil, cling film, a plastic bag, a tissue and piece of felt through a fair experiment. We decided that the plastic bag would be the best material to use as it was lightweight, waterproof and strong!



Character:

Hedgehog Class were very courageous on Thursday when getting up to sing and sign the Dingle Dangle Scarecrow at our Harvest Festival. They sang clearly and looked ahead the whole time, what Inspiring Performers they are! Community:

We thoroughly enjoyed our visit from Apollo's Cabinet, thanks to the support of Soundwaves Southwest. They played us a range of pieces of Baroque music from the 1700's and taught us about some different elements of music such as tempo and dynamics. We had great fun singing, dancing and clapping along!



Digital and Innovation:

After learning about healthy eating and the 'Eat Well Plate', we decided that Paddington's marmalade sandwiches are not a balanced meal! We decided to design him a healthy wrap to take on his travels which included a source of protein, vegetables and dairy.









Fox Class - What's happened here before us? (The history of Britain from the Stone Age to now)

Academic:

Over the past two weeks, Fox class have been thinking about how they can use adjectives in their writing to create effect. They have been writing stories that create a sense of mystery and have been thinking about "showing and not telling" the details of their setting descriptions. In guided reading, they have thought about predicting what is going to happen next in the text. They have applied the skill of prediction to their science when investigating whether the length of our femur affects how far we can



Character:

It has been lovely to see the children demonstrate the character virtue of friendliness over the past two weeks. They have been "spotted" around school, looking out for each other and supporting each other where needed. Fox Class have also been complimented by the cover teacher, Mr Seymour, about how



lovely they were to work with. Our character virtues are really embedded within the class, and the children were able to quickly identify how character links to Harvest time. They produced some lovely ideas for the Harvest Service. It was great to see the character virtue of courtesy displayed when the children were tasting the food that had been created with the gardening group.

Community:

Fox Class have participated in the school gardening activities, and recognised the importance of being part of the school community when baking the food for the sharing afternoon. They were extremely courteous during the sharing afternoon, where they all tasted a range of food that was cooked and prepared by the school community. In their topic work, Fox Class have been looking at farming in the Stone Age and Iron age and comparing it to today.





Digital and Innovation:

Fox Class are enjoying using their Chrome Books to learn their multiplication facts. They have been using a variety of websites to support this.

In Design and Technology, Fox class enjoyed baking with the gardening group. They also enjoyed their studies of packaging for different foods and created their own boxes for biscuits. Different types of packaging were considered, along with the shape of the different packages.

Academic:



He talked about the courage, resilience, motivation and determination that is needed when sailing on incredibly rough seas. He also talked about more recent experiences on research vessels tracking and monitoring different types of whales in Antarctica.

This was all linked to our guided reading book – 'Shackleton's journey'.



Community:



We have just completed our first unit of art this week. It was great to learn about artists and architects such as Hundertwasser.
