Academic:

Hedgehogs and Squirrels - Where in the world is Alan and The Go Jetters?

Academic:

When we returned to school after half term, we discovered Alan the Alien had packed his bags to travel the world with The Go Jetters! He is sending us postcards to keep us updated on his adventures and he is currently



learning about different animals and their habitats.... he has just discovered a new species of Iguana in The Amazon Rainforest! We decided to join him on his learning journey and study woodland



habitats. We have become Inspiring Researchers, making use of our ICT skills to search for information about foxes, barn owls and dormice on the internet. We were fascinated to discover that the fox is at the top of the food

chain! Where will Alan take us next?

Over the past two weeks, we have focused on the character virtue of resilience. The children have a really good understanding of what resilience means and they can give some really good examples of times they have 'bounced back'. We are now concentrating on difficult feelings we may experience when trying to be resilient, such as frustration, anger and annoyance, and thinking of strategies we can use to help us feel calm again. We came up with a really long list including: taking deep breaths and counting to 10, having a drink of water, reading a book, listening to music, drawing a picture or colouring, playing with a fidget and having a walk or run around.

Community:

We had a really lovely time celebrating World Book Day on Thursday and we loved seeing the children in their wonderful costumes. As we are learning about woodland



animals and their habitats, we focused our learning around one of our favourite texts, 'The Gruffalo' by Julia





Donaldson. The children enjoyed cooking Purple Prickle
Pancakes, building traps, acting out the story with small world animals and
creating playdough models.

Digital and Innovation:

During World Book Day, the children were challenged to design their own woodland monsters and write a character description. Reception had to write a simple sentences, year one needed to join their sentences using 'and' and include some adjectives, while year 2 were encouraged to include some expanded noun phrases. Let's hope we don't come across them at Beer Mill!











Fox Class - Why are Rainforests important to us?

Academic:

This week we have come to the end of the multiplication and division unit. Then we have moved on to Length and Perimeter. In English we have started to write the Non-Chronological reports based on towns, cities and Villages within the UK.

In Science we have started to look at the digestive system and also looking at what are teeth are for. The children made a clay model of a set of teeth, a lot of resilience and creativity was needed for this activity.



Character:

Our focus virtue for the last couple of weeks have been resilience and Critical Thinking. These have been spotted in action and recognised throughout celebration assemblies and by all staff in school. We will continue to focus on many virtues throughout the rest of the term.

Community:

This week was World Book Day, the children were fantastically dressed. We also joined an online Michael Rosen workshop. Where Michael Rosen shared some of his poems and told us lots of his stories. Even sharing that a lot of his books and poems are based on his real life experiences.



Digital and Innovation:

This week the children have been using their Chromebooks to look at what an email is and why we send emails. We have also looked at the importance of not sharing personal information through an email or sending inappropriate emails. We also spoke about once something has been sent it can be traced back to the original sender, therefore really taking time to think about if the email should be sent.





Badger Class

Academic:

Last week we completed Romeo and Juliet with a synopsis of the story. We also completed our maths unit on Decimals which the whole class got to grips with very well. We also completed our elicitation tasks geography and for science. This term we are looking at living in the desert and circulation and health.


The children in school did some fun science with Coke and mentos to create a volcano.
